MISSION STATEMENT

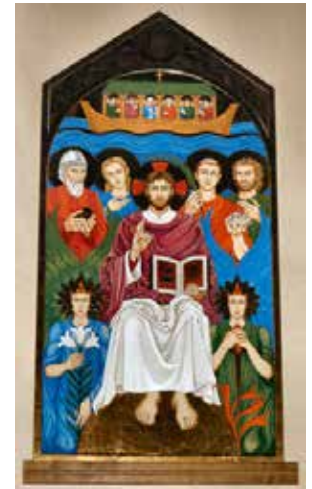

The Season of All Saints

I am writing to you from my favorite coffee shop on Halloween morning. All Hallows' Eve seems to have moved from a one night celebration of tiny ghosts and goblins in search of treats to an entire season of fright. Zombies, vampires, mummies, and various other dead things, graveyards emitting spine chilling music, foggy nights, and all that our minds can conjure as images of terror are everywhere. All of this from All Hallow's Eve, which, in fact, is the eve of All Saints Day.



All Saints Day is the Church's way of remembering all of those exemplary Christians whose faith-filled lives are an inspiration to us. We remember them not because they are perfect people. They aren't perfect people. They do not work miracles on our behalf. They are not closer to God than us. We remember them because something about the way they lived, in all of their imperfect humanity, shows us something about what it means to be a person of faith. On All Saints Day we celebrate the communion of saints, the whole Body of Christ in the past, in the present, and in the future. We are in communion with those who have gone before and those who come after us, united in a common purpose of sharing the love and grace of God with the world.

It is no accident that our season of stewardship comes at this time of year. Stewardship is the Church's way of talking about what we do with what we have been given by God. All that we have comes from God. Everything. Stewardship is about how we use the resources we have been given to honor God and one another, and to grow in our faith in and relationship with God. If it were not for the good stewardship of those who came before us, we would not be where we are today: as local as the Church of the Epiphany, founded in 1980, by a small group of visionaries who saw a need and filled it, to as far back as the first Christians and their commitment to founding a church where forgiveness and love were primary. I give thanks for all that these saints of

God have given so that I may receive such blessing in the community of the church.

Likewise, it is our turn to ensure the blessings we have received are there for generations to come. Epiphany is a special place. It is a place of welcome. It is a place where you can come as you are, wherever you are on your journey of faith, and find God, find others like you on the journey, and find a safe place for your soul to explore, grow, and be transformed. I encourage you to consider the contribution you make to this great church of ours and to pray about what more you may be able to give. The Church exists today because every person matters and every contribution matters. That includes you, and me, and everyone at Epiphany.

Flourish in Faith *Stewardship Narrative Series*

Proper 26 - Luke 19:1-10

Sunday, November 3, 2013

*Zacchaeus, hurry and come down;
for I must stay at your house today*



Zacchaeus was rich and powerful. But he was powerful in a problematic way: his wealth came from his work as a tax collector for the Roman occupiers of Israel. You've probably already noticed that the gospel writers use the term "tax collector" as an insult, often linking it with "prostitute" or the more generic "sinner" – collecting taxes for Rome was not a way to win friends. People might have been scared of the amount he might assess them, and they must have hated his collaboration with their foreign overlords. Some tax collectors skimmed money off the top of their assessments. Zacchaeus may have been one of them. Add to this the fact that Zacchaeus seems to have been exceptionally short in stature: scripture hardly ever mentions what people looked like, but this physical fact about Zacchaeus has clung to him throughout the centuries!

So: a man with an unpopular job, with a physical appearance unusual enough to make him the butt of many an unkind joke in that town. We don't really know much about what kind of person Zacchaeus was on the inside, before meeting Jesus, but something about his spontaneous pledge makes us suspect the worst: "if I have defrauded anyone of anything." It's hard to credit that "if" – people usually know it when they've defrauded someone.

Nonetheless, Jesus will bless Zacchaeus' home with his presence. Knowing Zacchaeus to be a flawed human being does not stop Jesus from reaching out to him. He is ready to bless Zacchaeus now, before he's had a chance to make any of the amends he promises, and this experience of Jesus' unconditional love makes the tax collector want to turn his life around. He wants to become worthy of his blessings. He'll still be a short guy, I guess. Nothing wrong with that. But he's about to grow a great deal as a human being.

We don't meet Zacchaeus again in the pages of the New Testament, so we don't know if he was able to keep his promise: "half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor." We do know that he found joy if he did: nobody finds lasting happiness hoarding money, and even the beautiful things it can buy are not enough to secure us joy. You find your joy in giving it away.

CONEJO COMPASSION COALITION (CCC)

In August 2013 the Conejo Compassion Coalition completed a major expansion of the medical clinic which was first opened in 2009 in eastern Uganda. The new 4,800 sq. ft. building is more than 3 times the size of the previous facility and better equipped to the needs of the patients and staff. The new building contains a spacious outpatient clinic, a pharmacy, two exam rooms, an emergency room, a laboratory and facilities to house up to 24 in patients. This medical centre, located in the village of Lwaboba has now become the only health centre of Grade III or higher, in Bumasiye sub-county, and has capacity to serve many surrounding villages, including the neighboring Tororo district.



The grand opening ceremony on August 17, 2013 was attended by a team of 6 CCC members and representatives from the Canadian based Scott Smed Foundation which provided significant funding for the project. Local representatives included: the Mbale District Chairman, a Member of Parliament, a representative from the Ugandan Ministry of Health and several local political leaders. Planning is currently underway to add an operating room and a maternity ward to further enhance the medical services provided to the region.

WHAT ARE THE CHILDREN DOING?

What thoughts do the words "Sunday school" conjure up for you? Does Sunday school bring back memories of rote learning Bible verses, singing songs about "Counting our blessings" (even when we were not sure what they were?) Is it listening to the retelling of Old Testament stories about floods and fights with giants? Or, is it a church based babysitting service so the rest of us can worship in peace? Have you ever wondered, "What are the children doing?"



Well actually, in our Children's Ministry, we are doing exactly what everyone else is doing at Epiphany. We are building our personal relationship with God through worship, prayer, meditation, and fellowship within our church community.

In the nursery, the youngest children are cared for by church members. We offer stories and toys that are both secular and religious. Cynthia O'Rourke and other volunteers, who work on a roster, are in the small room off the Bishop's Hall. So if you have a child aged 6 months to 3 years, please try out the nursery for them. They will be welcomed and cared for, and you will be able to be fully present for worship. In our two Atria, The Good Shepherd Atrium and The True Vine Atrium, we use Catechesis of The Good Shepherd (CGS). This Montessori based program is rich in the words of Scripture and the traditions of our faith.

Ellen Gury is one of two Catechists who work in The Good Shepherd Atrium. Ellen is certified in the CGS Level I formation training, and has been involved with CGS at Epiphany for over 2 years. She is also a member of our Altar Guild Ministry. Ellen shared this about her work as a Catechist: "Our children at Epiphany are so fortunate to have the opportunity to be involved in Catechesis of the Good Shepherd; I wish my own children had. Interacting with stories in the words of the Bible, children use materials to construct meaning for themselves."



In addition, the children use materials from the rituals of the church to understand and experience what they see in the Eucharist. Music joyfully supports and enhances the content. Not only is spiritual growth evident in the children, but I have experienced it myself preparing for being in the atrium and volunteering in the atrium. The intensive course training covers the Montessori philosophy as well as Biblical and Liturgical content. My knowledge of all those areas was challenged and expanded. It is a joy to spend time with your children in the atrium.



So take the opportunity at coffee time to ask one of the children about Catechesis. Those of you who have children or grandchildren, talk to them about their experiences. I am sure most of them will have something to say that will put a smile on your face and help you 'Count your Blessings.'



The Epiphany Youth Group 1 (EYG 1), grades 6, 7, 8, and 9, meets on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of each month. Meetings are from 11:45 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., unless otherwise specified in the EYG weekly newsletter. On the first Sunday of each month we have Youth Gathering. Youth Gathering always begins with music, so bring your singing voice and a musical instrument if you play one! Each Youth Gathering has a theme that is our focus for learning and discussion. We also share a meal and play games. On the third Sunday of each month we build on the theme discussions at Youth Gathering with a Christ Building Activity. Christ Building Activities are challenging group activities where the group must create a solution to a problem by working together.

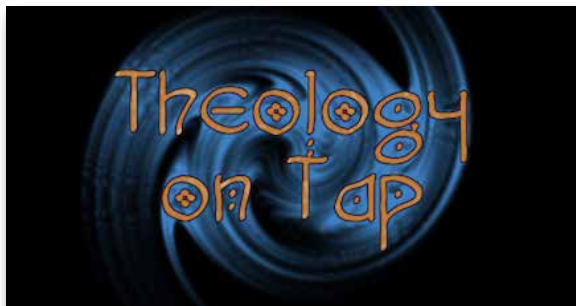

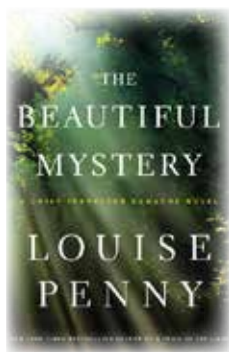
